LWVSC Supports the Proposed Saratoga Springs City Charter

The League of Women Voters of Saratoga County (LWVSC) announces its support for the proposed new charter for Saratoga Springs. We believe that it is important to separate the legislative functions of government from the administrative ones, to have a strong centralized administration, to have clear lines of responsibility, to be representative of the entire community, to be efficient and cost-effective. LWVSC determined that the current charter doesn't meet those goals.

LWVSC supports the proposed new charter, which creates a council-manager form of government, because it will provide for the separation of powers. It does this by creating a seven-person City Council (including a voting Mayor) who will hire a qualified city manager to run all of the City's departments. LWVSC expects that more people from diverse backgrounds will run for office and elections will become more competitive when Council members don't also have to run a department.

The board of LWVSC took this position of support for the proposed new charter at its September board meeting, deciding that it met the requirements

of the position on the Governance of Local Governments adopted in April, 2017. (<http://www.lwvsaratoga.org/pdfs/localgovernmentconsensus.pdf>). The membership reached that consensus following a study of local governments begun May 30, 2015.

On September 21, 2017, we held a forum featuring a panel from the Charter Review Commission to speak about the process and the proposal. The panelists were, Gordon Boyd - founder of EnergyNext, Inc., former NYS Assembly staff member, Minita Sanghvi -assistant professor, Management and Business, Skidmore College and Barbara Thomas -LWV member and Co-President, former health clinic director. The room was full and the audience was engaged, asking questions after the panel presentation. At the end of the event, time was allowed for the audience to have their voices heard with an invitation to state their thoughts on the proposal.

We'll Miss These League Members

Mary Jane Crotty died August 30th at age 76. She was retired from a career as a statistician for the NYS Board of Education in Albany.

Mia Mouzon Groce` died August 23rd at age 92. She grew up in Saratoga Springs and was the first woman of color to graduate (in 1947) from Skidmore College. Racism and bigotry were things she dealt with throughout her life – always with grace, dignity and determination. Mia was on the cover of Jet magazine in 1953; she taught school in Florida; she served on the 2001 Saratoga Springs Charter Review Commission; she was an inspiration to her daughter and grand daughter.

John Nelson, former healthcare executive and Yaddo finance director, devoted husband to Lee, father, friend, volunteer and martini aficionado, died August 30th at age 91. John spent his career in the non-profit sector, pioneering and building some of the country's first affordable health care networks. Nelson served on many local boards and organizations including the Saratoga Springs Rotary, Saratoga's Art Council, Mary's Haven, GHI/HMO and the Chekov Sisters City program.



An Observer Corps (OC) is a program to ensure access to government information as stipulated in the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA, 1966),

Federal Advisory Committee Act (1972) and the Sunshine Act (1976). Access to both public records and public meetings is protected by these laws.

OC provides a unique opportunity to learn about government meetings held in Saratoga County, provide oversight to insure transparency, and share information with the League of Women Voters Saratoga County (LWVSC). This is not a new initiative but rather a continuation of past efforts.

The emphasis for members of the OC should be to attend local meetings of particular interest to them. Coordination of information from individuals and reported monthly to the LWV creates a summary of local government issues, efforts to address challenges and transparency procedures.

A Strong Constitution: Stepping Up to Protect Our Democracy

Join us for a series of discussions on the principles of our U.S. Constitution. Spawned from the American Revolution, and rooted in our history, our rights and freedoms are the bedrock of our democracy and protected by the Constitution. 

This September our League delivered 2087 sets of Voter Materials to Saratoga County teachers in 11 high schools in Saratoga County - so the teachers are prepared to register High School Seniors!

Each set consisted of Voter Registration Forms, First Vote Pamphlets and Your Right to Vote Pamphlets to. The high schools receiving materials this year were Burnt Hills, Corinth, Galway, Hadley/Luzerne, Mechanicville, Saratoga Springs, Schuylerville, Shenendahowa, South Glens Falls, Stillwater and the Waldorf School. Ballston Spa gets their own forms, and Saratoga Catholic had enough left over from last year.

The teacher in Corinth requested (and got) 100 League pens this year to give to each student on their birthday along with a voter registration form.

Take Me to Vote!

Take Me to Vote (TMTV) is a program to encourage fifth- grade students to go to the polls with their parents, and parents to go to the polls with their child. Suzanne Bishop is coordinating the program this year.

When a child goes to the polls with an adult, the poll workers place a stamp (provided by LWVSC) on a form the child takes to the polls – to prove that the child went to the polling place. Each child who went to the polls also gets a sticker when they turn in their form at school. The classroom with the most participants in each school gets a plaque or certificate. And the classroom with the most participation in each assembly district wins a visit from their state legislator.

Many thanks to Suzanne’s book club, Friends and Counsel Book Club, for putting the classroom and poll workers packets together for us.

Death with Dignity: Do We Concur?

Our Meetup on November 15th will focus on whether or not we agree with the following two-part position:

1. The League of Women Voters of New York believes state laws should grant the option for a terminally ill person to request medical assistance from a relevant, licensed physician to end one's life.
2. The League of Women Voters of New York believes such legislation should include safeguards against abuse for the dying and/or medical personnel who act in good faith compliance with the law.

The above wording is based on the position developed by the LWV of Utah, after conducting a study of the issue. Our committee (Donna Dardaris, Terry Lowenthal, Darnell Rohrbaugh, Sharon Sassaman, Barb Thomas, chair) will present findings from the study by LWV Utah. In the meantime think about these arguments:

Pro: The argument for autonomy in end-of-life decision-making advocates for a person being able to determine how she/he lives and dies.

Relief from pain and suffering is the other primary argument for the legalization of Death with Dignity. One's quality of life is diminished by pain and suffering in various forms, including mental anguish, loss of physical capabilities and dignity.

Con: Most people have a strong conviction about the wrongness of killing.

It is also argued that Death with Dignity is suicide, and that suicide is intrinsically wrong.

Saving lives is ingrained in all healthcare professionals, from physicians and nurses to lab technicians. They are committed to healing and saving lives.

The possibility that a Death with Dignity law opens the doors for potential abuse raises fears and strong objections.

This year LWVSC had voter registration tables everywhere. We were at the Saratoga Springs Farmer's Market (many times), the Clifton Park/Halfmoon Public Library Community Day, Irish



Fest, the Peace Fair, four Naturalization Ceremonies and on National Voter Registration Day (NVRD) we were at seven locations, including Saratoga Hospital, Ben & Jerry's, Bow-Tie Cinemas and two colleges (Skidmore & ACC Wilton).

Here's what Kathy Koebrich, the coordinator of NVRD had to say:

First, I want to thank all of you for helping with the National Voter Registration Day 2017. It was wonderful to have so many dedicated volunteers and locations to provide this service to the citizens



of Saratoga County. League members, decked out in white shirts, buttons and LWV Suffragist sashes, spoke to over 500 people on National Voter Registration Day! The public was appreciative and interested in what we had to say and many took our brochures.

We were able to register over 56 voters and many others took registration forms and absentee ballot applications home with them. We were available to answer questions about voting and provide information about the upcoming November election and ballot proposals. Both the Saratoga County LWV and the Organ Donor Program received some excellent visibility. Fifteen people filled out organ donor forms and a few others took brochures.

Excluding NVRD (reported above), our voter registration efforts resulted in: 24 completed Voter registration forms; 13 voter registration forms taken; 7 absentee ballot application forms taken or completed; 5 organ donor forms completed; more than 275 Facts for Voters (part 1 & 2) handed out; hundreds of people spoken with about voting and the LWV.

Vote December 5 for Shenendehowa Land Preservation

The Town of Clifton Park and the Shenendehowa School District Board of Education have reached an agreement concerning 34 acres of wooded land. The Saratoga County LWV under its land use positions, supported a petition drive and referendum in Clifton Park to keep the land owned by the Shenendehowa School District in the public domain. The initiative was spearheaded by Clifton

Park Friends of Open Space. The League wrote letters and helped with the petition drive. The Town of Clifton Park will buy the land from the school district and keep it as wooded park land.

This was a true grass roots effort by citizens who showed they would rather have trees and park in the center of town than more blacktop and commercial development. Citizens including league members, collected over 5,000 signatures in the cold of December to force a referendum where about 7,000 people in the school district voted. The BOE and Town Board will approve the sale at their October meetings. The Shenendehowa School District citizens will need to vote again on this issue to approve the final terms and sale on December 5. Congratulations to all who worked on this drive. Thank them by voting on December 5th.
